

Board Chair/Vice Chair AGM Report: Sept 2024

As we put together this message for CCSSEBC's Annual Report and AGM, the board members, admin team and senior staff have just met for some strategic thinking and planning sessions.

"Inspiring," "invigorating," "clarity," "empowering" and "confident" are just a few of the words shared to express what we were feeling at the close of the final session.

Our strategic process was led by Christina Benty of Strategic Leadership Solutions. Earlier in the summer, Christina had gathered input from staff, and their contributions helped the board and admin team work together to identify the society's current and future needs. We're excited to share the strategic areas of focus that will take us to the end of 2026:

- Ensuring robust and resilient organizational capacity
- Fostering effective governance
- Elevating community engagement and advocacy
- Cultivating greater inter-organizational connection

Leading up to our strategic planning sessions, the senior management team and two board members participated in an organizational assessment done by Columbia Basin Trust's Non-Profit Advisors Program. The report gave CCS a very positive review, while recognizing that recent growth in our programs and services brings the need for capacity building, especially at the senior management level. This point became one of our key focus points when we met with Christina Benty, and the board looks forward to supporting Nancy and her team in finding solutions—we're fortunate to have such strong leadership!

Something impressive that came up time and again during our strategic planning meetings was that at the core of our society are the passionate and dedicated people who work within it—they are the roots of our success. We applaud everyone at CCS for your hard work and appreciate everything you do!

As for our board member team, we are grateful to have a strong, supportive and engaged group. Paul Knipe, our board chair, will be leaving the board at the end of December 2024—but he'll continue to volunteer at CCS in some capacity. Vice chair Colleen Osiowy will be stepping down after this year's AGM, but also plans to volunteer. Scott Manjak, who joined our board at last year's AGM, resigned in March due to time constraints. Continuing on the board are Susan Vollmer, Bob Kennedy, Rachel Freitag, Ryan Gibbard and Melissa Scott; they are joined by Katie Lacey, who came on as a director in June. Thanks to each of you for your energy and contributions!

Looking back at some of the year's highlights, we're proud to recognize:

- Another successful Coldest Night of the Year campaign in February
- A fun, well-attended Staff Appreciation BBQ in June—a great opportunity for connecting
- The new What's on Wednesdays (WoW) programming has been well received
- Lots of great fundraising events and successful grant funding acquisitions
- Numerous increases to program and service offerings throughout CCS

It's certainly been an impressive year, and we look forward to seeing what the year ahead brings!

During the 2023-2024 fiscal year, as we have in the last few years, CCS grew and changed. We had several key staffing changes this year. We gained Margo Dick as finance manager, Tara Beal took on duties in the finance department, Tracy Pound and Rita Romeo retired and Rebeccah Mitchell left our Supported Child Development team. Frankie Seitz took the lead at SKCCRR and Jenny Wilmot relocated to lead the SCD team.

We had four staff attend leadership training at College of the Rockies. Our Coldest Night of the Year fundraiser brought us \$23,000 to support our community.

The much-anticipated shelter opening is likely to happen in January.

Possible and/or confirmed projects in the works for next fiscal year include:

- Cozy bear housing 30 units for adults at risk of homelessness
- Urban farm hydroponic infrastructure to feed locals fresh greens each week
- Agriculture hub a community of resources connecting agriculture industry proponents
- Panorama ridge/30thAve. land purchase for housing/childcare
- Organizational review and strategic planning undertaken with a consultant
- Social enterprise opportunities
- Digital transformation
- Interior painting at CCS Hub
- Funding for additional admin capacity to match growth.

We enjoyed a lively game of music bingo at our Christmas Party and many moments of collegial laughter and celebration.

I am continually proud and amazed by our team who do hard things every day to make our communities better for the people who live here.

Cranbrook Women's Resource Centre



The Cranbrook Women's Resource Centre (CWRC) works to improve the status of women and their families through direct service provision and by advocating for social and systemic change. We have been a leader in supporting women in our community since 1982. The CWRC's support services include advocacy, lay counselling, information, referrals, crisis support, workshops, peer support groups, free hygiene products, free menstrual products, and free clothing to women in our region. The CWRC is funded fully by donations, grants, and fundraisers. Staff host yearly events to increase awareness about the challenges women face, build community, and raise funds to continue providing programming.

The Women's Centre introduced expanded hours this fiscal year, hosting drop-in hours on Wednesday evenings from 6pm-8pm for CCS's new offering, What's On Wednesdays (WOW). The WRC also offered a drop-in peer support group on Wednesday evenings, hosted in partnership with Summit Community Services Society's Sexualized Assault Support Program.

The WRC has continued to partner with United Way BC for the Period Promise campaign, which provides free menstrual products to girls and women who need them. We also continue to provide free clothing and hygiene products for any woman who needs them.

We also continued collaborations with the BC Office of the Human Rights Commissioner, and collaborated with other community agencies to assess human rights related issues in Cranbrook.

Staff transformed the WRC space to highlight trauma-informed design principles, with the goal of increasing safety, security, and support for women facing difficult situations.

Staff coordinated two fundraisers over this period, raising \$1000.00 in partnership with Purcell Golf for their annual Our Course Your Cause event, and over \$350.00 was also raised with the Women for Women Curling Bonspiel.

The WRC implemented a number of new programs this year. Staff began hosting Wellness Workshops, free for women to attend. We had internal and external skilled facilitators teach participants practical tools for enhancing well-being. Workshop topics included Pre and Postpartum Anxiety, Reflexology, Stress Management, Pelvic Floor Health, and Grief and Loss. We also introduced peer support groups on various subjects including Single Mom's Mental Health, Separation and Divorce, and an ongoing, general peer support group.

We are excited to continue serving our community and introduce new programming in the year to come!

The Community Partners Program and the Justice Navigator assists with Legal Aid applications, attending the Cranbrook and Creston courthouses on remand and family law days to assist individuals who do not yet have legal aid or representation. provides free legal information, assistance with legal aid applications, and help clients access legal resources online. We assist clients in person, over the phone, or through email. Over the past year, the programs reputation has grown and is now receiving referrals from the Cranbrook courthouse, probation, lawyers, and the Native Court Worker. Being present in the courthouse on family and criminal Remand days has helped this process

Throughout the year, the advocate attends monthly CP meetings. These meetings keep the advocate up to date on any changes within LABC, helping to deliver the best support to clients. Working alongside LABC also allows the programs to speed up time sensitive legal aid applications.

East Kootenay Child Care Resource and Referral

2023 - 2024 year in review

East Kootenay CCRR hosted a variety of workshops and conferences in the 2023/2024 year. We had speakers such as Dr. Shelley Moore who spoke on the topic Supporting One, Supporting All: Collaborative Support Models for Inclusive Communities. Monica Maddison who spoke on the topic Creating Inclusive Programs. As well as topics such as BC Employment Law Basics, Deconstructing Circle Time, and Effective Supervision.

EKCCRR staff attended the National Outdoor Learning Conference in Banff, Alberta.

The Ministry of Education and Child Care BC put out a Call for Response resulting in all CCRR's provincially having to apply for funding. This resulted in changes to the EKCCRR program that went into effect April 2024.

On March 31, 2024 Rita Romeo, SKCCRR Coordinator for 30 years, retired. We thank Rita for her years of service and dedication.


