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Our Annual General Meeting marks another year of pursuing our mission, but for me it feels as though 2024-2025 was merely a blink. It was a year of delivering quality services and working towards things that we expect to come to fruition in the following fiscal:

- The Food Innovation Center
- Cozy Bear Older Adult Housing
- BCBuilds Market and Affordable Housing New Build Application
- Shelter Opening

Some highlights and significant happenings:

- Our Facilities Manager Harlee came on board just at the end of fiscal and we don't know how we got it all done before she came.
- The first harvest of Cranbrook Urban Farm greens was exciting and tasty, and the farm produced well.
- Our Coldest Night of the Year raised 38K to support the Urban Farm and feed the hungry.
- The Shelter opened this month and although that is beyond the dates of this AGM reporting it just feels too big to go unsaid. We toured 130 people and another 70 after tour day.
- Charlene Stropky retired from the Infant development program.
- Laurie Harris moved on from Better at Home and we welcomed Erinn Willoughby into the position.
- We opened the Seniors Community Connector program, with funding from United Way BC, and Debbie Reid is now coordinator.
- Our longstanding programs that support our community continue to thrive with coordinators who are passionate about their programs and community.

Board Chair and Vice Chair Reports

As you know, Colleen and Paul resigned last year. We would like to thank them for their years of service and their support as Rachel and I began our terms. I would also like to thank all current Board members for their continuing interest and involvement. I will appreciate everyone's patience as I learn how to chair this AGM!

Much of my term has been spent watching Nancy fly, as one project after another was started, finished, or imagined. It's been a delight working with Nancy and with her amazing staff!

Many of the items from last year's Strategic Plan were realised this year, including acquiring Administrative Support and a Facilities Manager. We had another successful Coldest Night of the Year, Paul returned to help us with the Staff Barbecue, and the Children's Carnival was full to bursting.

From a Board recruitment point of view, we have updated the Board application on the Website to make it easier to complete online. We tried a new strategy with a table in the Market and a draw for a gift card to the Heidout. We had interest from several individuals. I am also happy to report that we have two new nominees for Board positions to be voted on at this meeting:

Robin Hicks is currently Vice President Academic, College of the Rockies. She has extensive experience with Board structure and Governance and is interested in joining the Board to support the important work she sees Community Connections doing in and for our community.

Jayla Toonenburgh has recently started her own counselling service. She believes that joining the Board would give her the opportunity to contribute to an agency that aligns with her values and meets needs she believes are important to her community.

Rachel has information on some of our large ongoing projects:

Community Connections has seen an incredible amount of progress and activity this year, and all of the staff and program employees deserve the highest praise possible. Our board has been cheering you all on as you've overcome some particularly lengthy obstacles with impactful results. I'm going to highlight four of them:

- 1) The Cranbrook Urban Farm put its hydroponic growing operation into gear this January, with its first harvest a mere month later. To see all of that hard work and planning produce 600 heads of tender, sweet lettuce weekly, with no dirt, pesticides or herbicides was impressive. The proceeds from Coldest Night of Year this year (\$38,000), went to support this project that aims to grow local lettuce year round to help combat food insecurity. A portion of their yield was donated to programs such as school lunches and the Food Bank, and it was also available for purchase at various locations around town. Stay tuned for the first autumn harvest!
- 2) Only a couple of months later, aided by a one million dollar donation from United Way BC, the Good Food Programs of CCS finally achieved the go ahead to continue their dream of having all of their programming under one roof. After months of searching, an application for a zoning bylaw amendment, two city council readings, and a final public hearing that resulted in a unanimous vote in favour, the new Cranbrook Food Innovation Centre was truly born by securing the property they needed for their purposes: to continue supporting the community by combating food insecurity and making a basic human need available to everyone.
- 3) Continuing on the theme of months and/or years of planning coming to fruition, two major housing projects were finally realized. The Step Beyond Shelter recently opened its doors, where 40 welcoming and well thought out shelter spaces await folks experiencing homelessness. This project was done in conjunction with BC Housing and is said to be a model for other communities to follow. The dedication and perseverance required of CCS staff and program employees to make this project a reality is difficult to quantify.
- 4) The Cozy Bear is another housing project done in conjunction with BC Housing, with CCS as the operator. It will welcome local vulnerable seniors and older adults experiencing, or who are at risk of, homelessness. Thirty homes with a variety of support services are on track to open their doors sometime between December and January.

Our Mission & Services

include advocacy, lay counselling, information, referrals, crisis support, workshops, peer support groups, free hygiene products, free menstrual products, and free clothing to women in our region. The CWRC is funded fully by donations, grants, and fundraisers. Staff host yearly events to increase awareness about the challenges women face, build community, and raise funds to continue providing programming.

The Cranbrook Women's Resource Centre (CWRC) works to improve the status of women and their families through direct service provision and by advocating for social and systemic change. We have

been a leader in supporting women in our community since 1982. The CWRC's support services

2024/2025 Snapshot

The Women's Centre introduced services in Kimberley this fiscal year, hosting drop-in services on Mondays from 11am-3pm at Grow Cake & Chocolate Factory. Kimberley access is supported the Kimberley and District Community Foundation. We also continued to provide drop-in hours on Wednesday evenings from 6pm-8pm for What's On Wednesdays (WOW).

The WRC also received funds from the Community Foundation of the Kootenay Rockies to support the creation of a resource library. Thanks to the Foundation's generosity, we have a variety of resources on current women's health and wellbeing issues available for service users to access while in the Centre.

Women Served Directly The WRC implemented a new offering this year called Info Hours. Info Hours bring information about community resources directly to women in a conversational, welcoming manner. WRC staff or community partners lead Info Hours on various subjects, including Family Law Protection Orders, the Intimate Images Protection Act, Sexualized Assault Reporting Options, Housing Options and Support Resources, Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing Therapy and other resources. Groups have been well-attended, with participants ranging from service users to community partners.

The WRC has continued to partner with United Way BC for the Period Promise campaign, which provides funds for menstrual products to girls and women who need them. This year we saw increased access by youth in Kimberley, providing over 50 products to girls who, according to another service provider, would not otherwise have access. We also continue to provide free clothing and hygiene products for any woman in need.

Menstrual Product Packages Distributed

Staff continued to host peer support groups for women to connect with others who share their experience. Groups offered over this period included Healing From Coercive Control, Single Mom's Mental Health, Separation and Divorce, and Infertility Peer Support Groups.

Finally, CCS acquired Life Balance Health and Fitness over this fiscal. The WRC continues to provide support to operations and work with the gym to increase access for women who wish to improve their physical health and mobility in a supportive social environment.

Providing advocacy services throughout the Kootenays to individuals with assets under \$20,000


Legal Issues Include:

The advocates also refer to community programs and Legal Aid as needed, liaise with community programs and legal counsel; and provide legal information workshops to community.

The Family Law Advocate Program is seeing approximately 450 clients per year, and although we are based in the Creston and Cranbrook area the clients accessing the program range from throughout BC and Alberta (we even had a call from a woman in New Brunswick)





COMMUNITY PARTNER & JUSTICE NAVIGATOR Legal Aid

The Community Partners Program and the Justice Navigator assists with Legal Aid applications, attending the Cranbrook and Creston courthouses on remand and family law days to assist individuals who do not yet have legal aid or representation. Provides free legal information, assistance with legal aid application, and help clients access legal resources online. We assist clients in person, over the phone, or through email. Over the past year the programs reputation has grown and is now receiving referrals from the Cranbrook Courthouse, probation, lawyers, and the Native Court Worker. Being present in the courthouse on family and criminal Remand days has helped this process significantly.

Throughout the year, the advocate attends momnthly CP meetings. These meetings keep the advocate up to date on any changes within LABC helping to deliver the best support to clients. Working alongside LABC also allows the programs to speed up time sensitive legal aid applications.

Programs have assisted with over 96 Clients/consults this last year



HOMELESS OUTREACH & PREVENTION



What we do:

- Provide info about housing including tenant and landlord rights
- Connect people with housing when available
- Help with housing applications
- Advocate and refer individuals to available resources
- advocate for more housing in Cranbrook
- Provide short term rental subsidies or one time assistance
- Work with other community agencies to help maximize support systems

What we don't do:

- Provide housing
- Help home owners
- Provide assistance outside of Cranbrook/Kimberley
- Subsidize those who are subsidized in their housing
- Be a persons only source of income
- We are short term helpers not long term financial support

Who we serve:

- People of all ages on a case by case basis
- Unhoused Persons
- Unstably housed
- Couch surfing or at a high risk of homelessness




Homeless Shelter 2024/25 Traffic




We received an additional 9 rooms in November to house more folks through the cold weather.

Bellies to Babies Pregnancy Outreach Program

Families enjoy learning, connections and support

Bellies to Babies offers pre and postnatal drop in groups each week in Cranbrook and a mixed group and Outreach to Kimberley and Surrounding Areas.

Outreach support needs have increased by approximately 60%

Southeast Kootenay Child Care Resource and Referral



April 2024 marked a significant period of change for CCRR. After more than 30 years of supporting child care programs and families throughout the entire East Kootenay region, CCRR is now contracted to support the Southeast Kootenay region. The new service area includes Cranbrook and the Elk Valley. To reflect this shift in service area, our name has changed from East Kootenay CCRR to Southeast Kootenay CCRR. Additionally, through a subcontract with Golden CCRR, we continue to support the town of Kimberley as well. Rita Romeo retired after over 30 years of dedicated service with CCRR. Frankie Seitz assumed the role of Coordinator for SKCCRR. Additionally, Colleen Watts, who had worked with CCRR for over five years, moved on to pursue other opportunities.

For a couple months SKCCRR operated with a team of three staff members: Frankie Seitz, Shirley Jowsey, and Rachel Drew until December 2024, when Susan Gilchrist joined the team. Relocating from Ontario to Cranbrook. SKCCRR was once again operating at full staff capacity!

We hosted numerous successful workshops and conferences. some examples are:

- October 2024, we partnered with East Kootenay Supported Child Development and EK Early Years to bring
 in Dr. Deborah MacNamara, who presented on her topic titled Eat, Sleep, Play: What Kids Need from
 Caretakers. The conference had over 150 child care professionals, community partners, and families in
 attendance.
- March 2025 we hosted *Let's Talk About Touching*, "a comprehensive program designed to support children's learning about personal safety and body awareness, specifically aimed at increasing abuse resistance skills in children aged 0–8 years" (Let's Talk About Touching website). This session was attended by 21 child care professionals.

May 2024 allowed the opportunity for SKCCRR staff to attend the ECEBC Conference in Richmond, BC. It was a rewarding three days filled with learning, connection, and professional growth.

The year 2024 and the beginning of 2025 brought changes and challenges for the SKCCRR team, but we persevered and have grown into the resilient team we are today.



Tumble Time

Tumble Time, located in the basement of St. Mary's Catholic Independent School, needed to be renovated at the beginning of September 2024 and became available to us again in March, 2025. During the renovations, we found temporary locations at the Ktunaxa gym and the soccer dome.

2024-2025 saw over 447 new children and 406 new adults attending our groups!
